Holocaust Memorial Day takes place on 27 January each year to remember the millions of people murdered during the Holocaust, under Nazi Persecution and in the genocides which followed in Cambodia, Rwanda, Bosnia and Darfur. It is also a time to learn the lessons of the past and recognise that genocide does not just take place on its own - it's a steady process which can begin if discrimination, racism and hatred go unchallenged. There is still much to do to create a safer future and Holocaust Memorial Day is an opportunity to start this process

The theme for 2021 is "Be the Light in the Darkness" and it encourages us to reflect on the depths humanity can sink to, but also to remember those who have strived to 'be the light' before, during and after genocide. There are different kinds of "darkness"; identity-based persecution, misinformation, denial of justice as well as different ways to "be the light"; resistance, acts of solidarity, rescue and illuminating mistruths
